
Sir,

I was the primary investigating officer on the murder of Dorka Lisker, which occurred in 1983 in Sherman Oaks, California. I believe it is critical and would strongly recommend that Mr. Bruce Lisker remain in prison for as long as the law prescribes. The facts of this case indicated that Mr. Lisker deliberately went to his mother's house, forced his way into the residence with the intent of robbing her. However, the victim confronted him and he reacted violently, striking her with a large exercise bar, crushing her skull. Then he attempted to cover up the crime by stabbing her twice and constructing a story to cover his crimes. The level of criminal sophistication was extremely high in this case and he never, at any time, displayed any remorse.

Several years after this crime occurred, I met with the new owners of the house where this crime occurred. They informed me they had found some money and several other items hidden in the attic of Bruce Lisker's old bedroom. The amount of cash found by the new owner was approximately \$150, which is the amount of money that was reported missing from the victim's purse the day of the murder. This revelation confirmed our initial theory that Mr. Lisker had in fact robbed his mother.

Mr. Lisker remains a constant threat to anyone that comes into contact with him and to society at larger because of his explosive violent nature. He has clearly demonstrated what he is capable of and should never be released to prey of anyone else in the future.

**DECLARATION OF MORTON P. BORENSTEIN**

**I, MORTON P. BORENSTEIN, declare as follows:**

**1. I am over the age of eighteen years, and am a resident of Los Angeles County. As to the hereinafter stated facts, if called upon to testify, I could and would do so competently as to the truth of them from first-hand, personal knowledge.**

**2. Beatrice T. Borenstein and I purchased the property located at [REDACTED] Huston Street, Sherman Oaks, California, hereinafter referred to as "the property" from Robert B. Lisker. We took title to "the property" on April 3, 1984. "The property" was sold to Doron and Adina Aloni on June 2, 1995. From April 3, 1984 until June 2, 1995 "the property" was my primary residence. We did not rent the property to anyone.**

**3. When escrow was supposed to close on "the property" (April 3, 1984), it was disclosed to me that a few weeks prior to this meeting there had been a homicide inside the residence located on "the property."**

**4. When I was told about the homicide I checked with the police department and learned that the detective assigned to the homicide which occurred at "the property" was a Detective Monsue of the Los Angeles Police Department.**

**5. I spoke with Detective Monsue on the telephone. I recall during our telephone conversation that Detective Monsue said he had arrested Mr. Lisker's son for the murder of his adoptive mother. Detective Monsue also told me there was a possibility a theft was perpetrated during the crime. Additionally, Detective Monsue stated there was some question as to whether Mr. Lisker's son committed the crime or Mr. Lisker's son's friends. During my telephone conversation with Detective Monsue I**

did not claim to have found anything at "the property," including cash in the attic, or anywhere else.

6. The conversation detailed in paragraph five (5) is the only time I spoke to Detective Monsue. My wife, Beatrice, never spoke to Detective Monsue. My wife and I never met with Detective Monsue.

7. Beatrice and I did not find any cash or anything else in the attic at "the property." I did not tell Detective Monsue, or anyone else for that matter, that I found anything, including cash in the attic of "the property."

I declare under the penalty of perjury under the laws of the United States of America that the foregoing is true and correct. Executed this 12<sup>th</sup> day of November 2001 at Encino, California.
