**PLAINTIFF'S, JENNIFER BRINKMAN, MOTION TO PREVENT DEFENDANT, DR.
BRENDA C. SNIPES, IN HER OFFICIAL CAPACITY AS SUPERVISOR OF
ELECTIONS, FROM CLAIMING IMPOSSIBILITY OF PERFORMANCE AS A
RESULT OF ESTOPPEL, WAIVER, AND LACHES**

1. Plaintiffs filed their Complaint in this action on Thursday, June 26, 2014, alleging that Defendant Tyron Francois, at the time of qualification, did not live within the boundaries of Broward County District 2; therefore, he does not qualify to run for the office of Broward County Commissioner for that district as a write-in candidate, based on the requirements of Fla. Stat. § 99.0615. The filing of this case was a mere three business days after Francois filed his last minute impermissible qualifying papers.

2. But for the impermissible qualification of Defendant Francois as a write-in candidate for the General Election ballot, Plaintiffs would be permitted under Florida law to participate in this determinative Democratic Primary.

3. The Broward County Supervisor of Elections website states that “[a]bsentee ballots are mailed no later than 45 days prior to each election for overseas [which includes military] voters. For all other absentee voters who have requested ballots they will be mailed between 35 and 28 days before an election.” (See Exhibit “A”, Excerpts from website for Broward County Supervisor of Elections.) The 2014 Democratic Primary will take place on August 26, 2014. The latest, then, that overseas absentee ballots will be sent to overseas voters is by July 12, 2014, and to all other voters between July 22 and July 29, 2014.

4. On June 27, 2014, Defendant Brenda Snipes, in her official capacity as Supervisor of Elections (“the Supervisor”), was served with the Summons and Complaint in this case.

5. Accordingly, the Supervisor has been aware of the issues in this case, and the relatively straight-forward facts demonstrating that Mr. Francois does not reside in District 2 as required by law. In fact, by her own admission the Supervisor originally took this matter so seriously (and the likelihood of Plaintiff’s success) that, according to statements attributed to her in the Sun-Sentinel, her office was going to treat the race of County Commissioner for District 2 as an open election: “We always do just-in-case thinking. ... We have to. We don’t want to get caught blindsided.” (See Exhibit “B”, Brittany Wallman, “House 96 and count D2 will be planned as open primaries”, July 3, 2014). Mary Cooney, the candidate liaison in the Supervisor’s office, confirmed an open election is “the way we’re proceeding.” *Id.* According to the Supervisor’s own website, there are 110,003 active voters in District 2, 23,439 of which are Republicans, 28,189 of which are not affiliated, and 1,846 classified as “other”. (See Exhibit “A”). Accordingly, almost 50% of active voters in District 2 (53,424) would be disenfranchised if the Supervisor is unable to comply with an order from this Court.

6. Nevertheless, in spite of the potential for disenfranchising over 50,000 District 2 voters, and having fourteen days' notice of this case, the Supervisor failed to file any responsive pleadings, motions, memorandum, or documents of any kind indicating that her position was any different than what she had represented in the local paper before appearing at the July 10, 2014 emergency hearing before this Court.

7. Instead, Burnadette Norris-Weeks, Esq, counsel for the Supervisor, shockingly claimed at the hearing that she's been blindsided. Specifically, she now claims that this matter, which involves the potential disenfranchisement of a substantial portion of the voters of District 2, does not constitute an emergency because the Supervisor would be unable to comply with any relief granted by this Court in any event, even though such failure to comply would admittedly violate Federal election laws.

8. It is axiomatic in Florida election law that a party cannot be heard to complain about deficiencies in the election process that are of their own making. *See, e.g., Winterfield v. Town of Palm Beach*, 455 So. 2d 359, 362 (Fla. 1984) ("a party is estopped from voiding an election where he was on notice of the irregularity before the election"); *Levey v. Dijols*, 990 So. 2d 688, 694 (Fla. 4th DCA 2008) (quoting *Winterfield*). Although the cited cases concern dilatory parties being estopped from challenging the results of an election on the basis of illegalities that were known at the time of qualifying, the rationale is the same in that in an election proceeding the courts of this state will not sanction delay tactics that create the untenable position that the party has placed themselves in. As admitted to the press, the Supervisor was well-aware of the relief being sought in this case and has only herself and her office staff to blame if the task of complying with any orders of this Court or federal election laws that may or may not be overly burdensome. At the end of the day, the constitutional rights

of the disenfranchised voters far outweighs any inconvenience that may be suffered by the Supervisor by her failure to anticipate the possibility of the Plaintiff obtaining the relief sought here.

9. At the very least, the Supervisor should have suggested reasonable alternatives in a gesture of good faith to show that her claim of impossibility is not the delay tactic that it so clearly appears to be.

10. Similarly, Defendant Tyron Francois, was personally served with the Summons and Compliant on June 26, 2014, should be estopped from asserting any last minute constitutional challenges that his counsel alluded to at the hearing, as they are likewise wholly unsupportable and nothing more than a thinly veiled guise to delay these proceedings at the expense of the voting rights of tens of thousands District 2 voters.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiff, Jennifer Brinkman, respectfully requests that Defendant, Dr. Brendan C. Snipes, in her official capacity as Supervisor of Elections, be estopped from any further claims of impossibility of performance.

Absentee Ballot and Early Voting Instructions

Who Can Vote an Absentee Ballot?

If you are a qualified registered Broward County voter, you are entitled to vote by absentee ballot.

Requesting an Absentee Ballot

One request shall be deemed sufficient to receive an absentee ballot for all elections through the next regularly scheduled 2014 General Election unless the elector or the elector's designee indicates, at the time the request is made, the elections for which the electors desire to receive an absentee ballot. The request can be made in person, by mail, by telephone, or fill out a request form now. Only the voter or a designated member of his or her immediate family or legal guardian can request an absentee ballot for the voter. Immediate family means the voter's spouse, parent, child, grandparent, or sibling of the voter or of the voter's spouse. Requests must be received by the sixth day prior to the election. A request from the voter must include the following information:

- The name of the voter for whom the ballot is requested
- The voter's address
- The voter's date of birth
- The voter's signature (written request only)

If the voter has designated an immediate family member or legal guardian to request an absentee ballot for him or herself, that designee must provide the above information in addition to the following:

- The requester's name
- The requester's address
- The requester's driver's license number, if available
- The requester's relationship to voter
- The requester's signature (written request only)

Obtaining an Absentee Ballot

Absentee ballots are mailed no later than 45 days prior to each election for overseas voters. For all other absentee voters who have requested ballots they will be mailed between 35 and 29 days before an election. Absentee ballots cannot be forwarded, but may be mailed to any location the voter chooses. Be sure the Elections office has your correct mailing address. A qualified absentee voter may designate in writing another person to pick up an absentee ballot for the voter. Pick up ballots are available, by prior request, up to five (5) days prior to the day of the election. Emergency excuse for Election Day absentee ballot delivery, except as provide in FS 101.655, limits Election Day delivery of absentee ballot to a voter or a voter's immediate family member. If an absentee ballot is delivered, the voter must execute an affidavit as to affirming to the facts of the emergency that precludes the voter from going to the voter's assigned polling place. (Exception for voters residing in an assisted living facility (s.101.655, F.S.) Ballot pickup is at the Voting Equipment Center in Lauderhill. The designee may only pick up two (2) absentee ballots per election other than his or her own, except for ballots picked up for members of his or her immediate family. The designee must provide a written authorization from the voter and complete an affidavit. A designee must present picture identification in order to pick up any absentee ballot.

Voting an Absentee Ballot

The voter must personally vote the ballot (unless assistance is required due to blindness, disability or inability to read or write). The voter must sign the return envelope.

Returning an Absentee Ballot

If a voter cannot mail or personally return his or her absentee ballot, someone else may return it.

If you decide to vote by mail using an absentee ballot, please consider the following:

*Do not allow anyone to assist you in voting unless it is a family member or trusted family friend.

*Do not allow anyone else to fill out your ballot and remember to sign the voter certificate after you seal the envelope.

*Do not give your ballot to a stranger - mail it yourself and make sure it is received by the elections office no later than 7:00 p.m. on Election Day or deliver it yourself.

Voted absentee ballots must be received by the Supervisor of Election's office no later than 7p.m. on Election Day. A VOTED BALLOT CANNOT BE ACCEPTED AT A POLLING PLACE.

If you requested an absentee ballot and later decide to VOTE AT THE POLLS, take your absentee ballot with you to be cancelled at your polling place.

Early Voting

Florida State Statute 101.657 (Effective 01/01/14) Expands minimum hours per day from 6 to 8, maximum hours remain the same 12 hours per day. Increases possible days - Minimum must begin on the 10th day and end on the 3rd day before an election that contains federal or state races on the ballot. The SOE may offer early voting on the 15th, 14th, 13th, 12th, 11th, or 2nd day before such an election. Expands existing permissible sites (existing sites include SOE main and branch offices, city halls, public libraries) to also include fairgrounds, civic centers, courthouses, county commission buildings, stadiums, convention centers, government-owned senior center, or government-owned community centers.

Supervisor of Elections to designate one additional site per election in an area of the county that does not have an eligible early voting location. This site must be geographically located to provide all voters in that area with an equal opportunity to cast a ballot. Requires each county to maintain at a minimum the same number of early voting sites for a general election it operated for the 2012 general election.

House 96 and county D2 will be planned as open primaries

Two Broward races will be planned as open primaries, just in case the courts rule that way.

If lawsuits seeking open primaries are not successful, the elections office would act accordingly.

"We always do just-in-case thinking," said Dr. Brenda Snipes, elections supervisor. "We have to. We don't want to get caught blindsided."

In state House District 96 and Broward County Commission District 2, lawsuits have been filed arguing that all registered voters in those districts should be allowed to vote in the Aug. 26 primaries.

The lawsuits are based on the fact that write-in candidates in those races, whose presence closed the primaries to Democrats only, are not qualified to run because they don't live within the districts where they're running.

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But time is ticking, and the Broward County Supervisor of Elections Office can't afford to wait for a late court ruling. Absentee ballots go out to overseas voters on July 12. Domestic absentee ballots start going out on July 22.

If the primaries in those races ultimately are open, Republicans and independent voters need those races on their ballots.

In addition, the ballot coding has to be done for early voting, which starts Aug. 15.

Mary Cooney, the candidate liaison in the elections office, said supervisor Snipes has decided to plan those races as if the primaries will be open.

If they didn't plan for it that way, and judges ruled that the primaries are open, the office would be faced with a chaotic situation, having to recode the elections at the last minute.

So, Cooney said, they're planning for an open primary in case the judges rule that way.

"That's the way we're proceeding," she said.

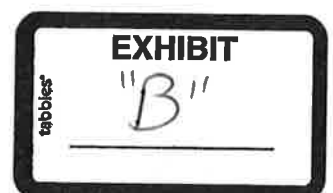
If the litigation ultimately fails, absentee ballot votes from Republicans and independents just wouldn't be counted, in those races.

For those who vote at the polls, signs would be posted letting non-Democrats know that if they vote in those races, it won't be counted, Cooney said.
